TITLE OF PAPER:	The Sustainable Planning and Management of Cultural Landscape in Nan'anzui, Wuhan
THEME:	<i>Theme 2: Cultural Landscape Practice and Management</i>
PAPER ABSTRACT:	
<p>Nan'anzui locates at the junction of the Yangtze River and its biggest tributary, the Han River. This article discusses the methodology in planning and managing this particular historic area. Formerly having a cluster of China's earliest private enterprises, this area was totally demolished after the big flood in 1998. This article argues that implementing the Recommendation on the Historic Urban Landscape on this kind of demolished area can also contribute to the planning and management of the future design and reestablishment. The article starts with the introduction of the significance of the location and the spirit of the place. Then it introduces the components of the historic layers, the social inclusion and community cohesion of the area. It then comparatively analyses the good/bad work of the former plans, which started as early as in 2000. The article concludes by providing a feasible way of planning and managing that historic area for a sustainable future guided by the methodology of HUL and the traditional Chinese concept: Shan-shui.</p>
